Friendship First Course at Linwood Avenue Union Church

Friendship First is a Christian course designed to introduce you to Islam and to Islamic cultural and religious customs so that we, as "People of the Book" (as Christians are called in the Qu'ran) can be good neighbours. The basic idea is that we learn how to break down stigmas and get over any cultural or religious roadblocks so we can build genuine friendships with our Muslim neighbours, which we see as an essential ministry following the still recent terrorist attacks on 2 mosques in Christchurch in March of 2019.

The 6 week course (spread out over 8 weeks, with the potential for an added mosque visit and hopefully a shared meal) provides a basic understanding of Islamic tenets, which are different to ours, but more so focuses on the similarities Christianity actually shares with this Abrahamic faith so that we can build on points of commonalty instead of arguing and debating religious truths. This way we are less concerned with conversion and more concerned with compassion and understanding and friendship. Once friendships are made, sharing your faith will become natural and who knows what the Holy Spirit may do within those relationships?
