

# **Gold Star Award**

Rev Martin Harrison, in Kaikoura, has recently been presented with the Gold Star award from the United Fire Brigades Association for 25 years service as a volunteer Firefighter.

Here, Martin tells us about his time as a Volunteer.

When I became the minister of the Awatere Christian Joint Venture Anglican, Presbyterians and others, I lived and worked in Seddon. Fire brigades struggle often for day time crew. I realised this was a way to the community and to make a difference when it was needed. Serving with Seddon Brigade for 7 years I learnt a lot about creating teams and community. How these could be utilised not just for the fire fighting tasks but also for enriching the wider community and individuals' life.

When we moved to Brightwater, I joined the Wakefield Fire Service and Brightwater Rural, in which I served for 16 years. Often when the pager went off I had to look to see who I was going out with – sometimes together.

For the last 3½ years I have been in the Kaikoura Fire brigade.

Alongside this I have 20 plus years with the Critical incident Stress Management Team. Being a Firefighter comes at a cost. They are humans that choose to expose themselves to abnormal things because of their desire to make a difference for others. This costs in terms of mental health and relationships, and it can at times can cause issues and the team's purpose is to help address and minimise the effects.

As a Christian, I take the words of Jesus seriously to be ready to help others. In John 15 it is recorded that Jesus said "This is my commandment, that you love one another as I have loved you. Greater love has no one than this, that someone lay down his life for his friends."

This is something that I have seen countless fire women and men do for others. Thankfully not in reality—no one has died but they give their time for others.

As a minister I am often asked if being a firefighter effects my job. Would I ever run of the method of a service? The answer is yes if it is Sunday morning and there were people in need. About a year ago I knew there was a lot of the Brigade away and the siren went just as I was about to preach, I passed my sermon notes to my

I could have none of the above without the support of the churches I have served and of course my family, who for the last 25 years have had to put up with me being unreliable—you cant pick when the siren will go off!

# Administrator, National Assessment Workgroup (NAW) and Minister Development Plan (MDP)

## The Role:

The Administrator (NAW/MDP) is responsible for providing administrative support for the Presbyterian Church of Aotearoa New Zealand (PCANZ) Minister Development Plan project (MDP), and the National Assessment Workgroup (NAW). These tasks include communicating, scheduling, administration, and quality assurance functions.

The successful appointee will be part of the Knox Centre for Ministry and Leadership (KCML) team. KCML forms ministers and leaders for service in the PCANZ and partner churches.
