

As the moderator I occasionally get the opportunity to catch up with people in the Presbytery and listen to their stories. Recently I met with David Sang-Joon Kim (Minister @ St. Marks) before he left to follow God's call north. He was gratefully reflecting on his time ministering alongside the people of St. Marks and on what God had been up to in their space.

It was exciting to listen as David Sang-Joon shared around his recent study leave on the metaphor of an Estuary from a theological perspective. He was particularly captured by the wetlands and how for many years they have had negative connotations as places of industrial wasteland. And yet the wetlands have an amazing ability to filter out toxins and act as a purifying agent for the water that passes through, allowing it to be a place that makes life possible. The wetlands gave a tangible expression to the work of Jesus on the Cross that resonated well in our context today compared to trying to help people understand the likes of penal substitution etc,

David Sang-Joon used to think of the estuary as being the gateway to the ocean but found that his study-leave allowed him to see the estuary as a gathering together of all the small streams, tributaries and larger rivers that flowed into it. This gave a great metaphor for St. Marks as they looked at all the tributaries that flowed through their physical space, mingling with those who gather for Christian worship.

The study-leave also opened up imaginative space around the question "what would it look like for our tributary to flow into the community we are hosted in?" David Sang-Joon noticed a small stream in their area that the community was working to restore from its "drain" status back to a healthy stream. Investigating further it turned out that the local community had been hard at work for several years trying to return this stream to its original healthy state. Here was a place in their community that God was already at work and they made a conscious decision to connect with what was already happening.

David gathered a team of volunteers from within the church and was delighted when members from the community groups hosted in the St. Marks buildings offered to join in as well. Together they began working with the locals to see the stream restored and new vegetation planted around its banks. He told the delightful story of one of the young helpers calling out to him nervously. He was watering a seedling he had just planted with water he had taken from the stream... only to find he had a fish wriggling around in his bucket of water! He wasn't sure what to do with it, but he was reassured this was an exciting moment as it meant the stream was once again able to sustain life.

As the tributaries from St. Marks Church, the community groups within St. Marks and the locals merged in their communal vision to see the stream restored new life emerged. New life not just for the fish but for all involved. A life-giving story worth sharing about what God is up to in our neighbourhoods.

We pray God's blessing on David Sang-Joon, Lisa and family as they follow God's call, on the people of St. Marks as they enter a transition time and on the Avonhead community. May we be inspired to see many more streams will be brought back to a place of being able to sustain life, both physical and spiritual.

Ministry Leaders Wānanga: 1st—3rd November, in Nelson

What is a wānanga? Wānanga: A space for open discussion, for gathering together to discuss different thoughts, opinions and experiences.

In te ao Māori, te wānanga is the traditional space where knowledge is gained and exchanged. It is a very Māori way of learning – to seek to come to a deeper understanding of the matters that are discussed, but not necessarily needing to come to an outcome or to result in a decision being made. **Wānanga are spaces where differences are welcomed.**

This wānanga is open to ministers, elders, and others who are serving in your parish. We hope that it will be a space where we can get to know each other better, engage with different ideas and learn together!
