

For a child is born to us, a son is given to us. The government will rest on his shoulders. And he will be called: Wonderful Counsellor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace. (Isaiah 9:6)

These words are so familiar to us at this time of year that we can be in danger of losing the astounding way in which God brought these words to pass some seven hundred years later. In writing a sermon last week I was reminded not only of this stretch of time but also of the four hundred years of silence that preceded Jesus' birth. There was no recorded prophetic word given by God from Malachi until God moved to fulfil this word. Four hundred years of silence! God's silence is not a thought that spring to mind when thinking about the birth of Jesus and yet four hundred years of God's silence preceded the most significant act of God's redemptive love as God became flesh and dwelled among us. Eugene Peterson once said, "any understanding of God that doesn't take into account God's silence is only a half truth."

God may have been silent, but the world was anything but silent. Not unlike our world today, it was full of the noise of those seeking power at the expense of the poor and oppressed. The noise of those clamouring for power as one people group clashes with another determined theirs is the only voice that needs to be heard.

While the one voice the world needed, that of God, was silent.

What broke the four hundred years of God's silence? The cry of a newborn baby! As God moved in the most unlikely of ways to speak divine love into the world. Alain Emerson and Adam Cox write "For to us a child is born. In one way childbirth is the perfect symbol of a new beginning, but as we turn the pages of the New Testament, we come to realize it is the birth of this child that will impact not just his own family but also carry the destiny of the whole world... A fresh infusion of grace is coming. God himself is coming. Incognito."

That is a great hope for us to hold on to this Christmas season.

When the noise of the world seems overwhelming, and God seems silent we can trust a fresh infusion of grace is coming. God himself is coming, though God may not come in the way we expect.

When injustice prevails and threatens to tear our families, communities and world apart, we can pray for a fresh infusion of God's grace. We must also realize that God might want to use our mouths, our minds, our heart, hands and feet for God's justice to be seen and heard.

PCANZ Response to the Recommendations of the Royal Commission of Inquiry into Abuse in Care

On 21 November, Council wrote to the Church with an update on our work related to the Royal Commission into Abuse in Care, and thanked the Council appointed task group that has assisted Council in its response. We advised Council has completed its response to the Commission's recommendations and that these would be published once finalised and translated to the other official languages of New Zealand - Te Reo Māori and New Zealand Sign Language.

In the December edition of Council News, published Monday 9 December, we noted that our Church's response needed a few iterations to ensure we get it right and fully commit to the mahi needed.

Also completed are the translations for which we are grateful for the assistance Deaf Aotearoa, and the assistance of Te Aka Puahou and Professor Taiarahia Black. Professor Black has also prepared a separate discussion document on, The Value of Translating the Royal Commission Recommendations and PCANZ Responses into Te Reo Māori.

The Church's response to the Commission's recommendations in English and Te Reo Māori, and the New Zealand Sign Language translation, as well as the Discussion Document are all available on the Church website: <u>www.presbyterian.org.nz/about-us/contact-us/historic-abuse</u>

The Church's response accepts the Commission's recommendations. We will focus on those recommendations that apply directly to the Church or require the Church to partner with and cooperate with the government, the proposed Care Safety regime, and work in partnership with survivors of abuse. Where the Commission has not directed specific recommendations to the Church, the Church nonetheless acknowledges those recommendations and will support their accomplishment

We have committed to participating in Puretumu Torowhānui and cooperating with the government over the adoption and implementation of a nationwide safeguarding regulatory framework, which the Church welcomes.

The Church has noted in its response that it requires more time in order to take the planning of its responses as seriously as this work deserves.

One of the Commission's recommendations is that our Moderator make a public acknowledgement and apology to survivors, their whanau and support networks for historic abuse. This is to come. While the Church has previously made sincere apologies at a Commission hearing, and in its response to the Commission findings, the Church's Moderator, Right Rev Rose Luxford, as well as the Moderator of Te Aka Puahou, Rev Tamiana Thrupp, and Moderator of the Pacific Presbytery, Rev Arona Tusega, are working on an apology which requires input from our Church's survivors. Initially it was thought consultation would be completed by mid to late November, however feedback from our survivors is that this sensitive process cannot be rushed; therefore, our survivors will have all the space and time they need, working to a timeframe that meets their needs.

Our Church has acknowledged the difficulty and frustration survivors of historic abuse face in distinguishing between the Presbyterian Church and the seven regions of Presbyterian Support - which are separate legal entities. We separate entities must find a way to work together to make the process to be heard and seek justice easier. Our Church is ready and willing to work with our affiliated social service agencies and schools, and we will initiate this.

We recognise the work we have ahead of us will be challenging. As a Church, we are committed to changing what we need to change, learning where we need to learn, listening where we need to listen, and doing better for all the people in our care past and present.

Loving God of justice and peace refresh our minds and stir our hearts. Show us where we have lost our way. Let us learn from our past mistakes. Help us to see a way forward. And in doing so May You bring comfort, peace, and healing to all.

Council now invites all our congregations, all Presbyterians, to share the Church's response.
